## **SOUTHERN AFRICA**

Special acts of worship were ordered in the Dutch colonies in southern Africa from the late seventeenth century, to 1902 in the Afrikaner republics, and throughout by the Dutch reformed church. These occasions may have been more frequent than those appointed in the British colonies and the Church of England, but they await research.

The lists below are for areas under the control of British authorities and the Church of England in southern Africa, and from 1910, for the Union of South Africa. Access to sources for the early 19th century has been limited; further research may well reveal that additional occasions were observed during this period.

Acts of special worship in these areas were sometimes related to occasions which had been or were being observed in Britain, or which were ordered or encouraged from London for observance in the whole empire. Details of these British occasions and communications with overseas authorities are given in *National Prayers* vols 2 and 3. These occasions are indicated in the list as follows:

- † occasions ordered on receipt of information of an occasion ordered in the UK. During the 19th century observance could be later than in Britain because of slow communications from London.
- \* indicates occasions ordered or encouraged from London for observance in the overseas colonies and dominions. These too might be at a different date to the UK observance.

The annual English 'state' religious commemorations would have been observed in places of worship of the Church of England, and from 1919 all churches observed Armistice day and Remembrance Sunday: see the list of 'Anniversary commemorations in the empire'.

The key to sources is at the end of the list. The abbreviations are:

CC Cape Colony

gov colonial or state governor

gov-gen governor-general of the Union of South Africa

govt Government

pm prime minister of the Union of South Africa

For gazette and newspaper references, the year of publication is the same as the year of observance, unless otherwise stated.

## British colonies in southern Africa

The Dutch Cape Colony, founded in 1652 and governed by the Dutch East India Company, was captured by the British during the French wars in 1795. At the Treaty of Amiens in 1802 the colony was passed to the Batavian Republic, a client state of the French Republic. When the wars resumed, British forces re-occupied the territory in 1806, and formal possession was recognised in the Anglo-Dutch treaty of 1814. The second British territory in southern Africa, Natal, was proclaimed a colony in 1843. Following the 1899-1902 South African War, the two Boer republics – the South African Republic (Transvaal) and the Orange Free State – became parts of the British Empire, with the new names Transvaal Colony and the Orange River Colony.
